

## Frontiers 11: Engaging Men and Boys in Sanitation and Hygiene Programmes - in French and Portuguese!



## Changes in open defecation in rural north India: 2014 – 2018



This paper reports on two surveys in rural north India shedding light on what the SBM campaign did and on changes in open defecation (OD) since 2014. It shows mixed findings. For example, on one hand OD has dropped from 70% to 44% which is great news, however the percentage of households with latrines who continue to practice OD remains constant at 24%. Overall the campaign looks set to improve health, but at some social cost, with coercion, threats and even violence being reported. [Download here.](#)

## How To Manual – the K-Ship Real Time Learning Approach



Development programmes tend to document the progress of their activities at the end of reporting cycles (monthly, quarterly, annually etc.). This approach has however not always been effective in significantly contributing to effective programming. As a result, K-SHIP made a collective decision to start reporting in ‘real time’ so addressing, documenting and sharing problems and learnings as they arise rather than a significant time after.
